# Ad Hoc Loan Committee By Mary Gin Kennedy, Chair

#### **Golf Course Special Assessment Approved**



The \$400 Special Assessment to pay off the golf course loan next spring (2025) passed easily on June 2 (Yes – 248 / No – 47 / No Vote – 1).

The Board of Directors and the Ad Hoc Loan Committee appreciate the willingness of

the membership to pay off this loan before the next balloon payment due on June 1, 2025.

The golf course loan balance as of May 31, 2024, was \$326,373. The Business Office has already received Special Assessment payments totaling \$19,600. Although the Special Assessment is not due until February 28, 2025, the sooner your

payment is received, the faster we are able to make additional principal prepayments. During FY-2024-2025, the loan balance will also continue to be reduced by an estimated \$86,600 through the regular monthly loan payments to HomeStreet Bank allocated from the \$16.17 in your monthly dues.

Members have been notified about the passage of the Special Assessment by the Business Office. The amount due will be shown on your AGYC monthly statement beginning in July. Your \$400 one time, lump sum payment may be made by check; through your monthly ACH transaction (you advise the Business Office of the month for the deduction); by credit card (3% service fee) or in cash. Interest and late fees will be collected after February 28, 2025, if payment has not been made. Please direct any questions about payment of the Special Assessment to Dawn or Becky in the Business Office.

# **EPAC (Emergency Preparedness Advisory Committee)** By Heather Boone, member

This month **Prepare In A Year** addresses **fire safety**. Please review and consider acting on the following:



Locate two ways to exit each room in your home. Locate a safe place outside your home to reunite with your family. Hold a fire drill at least twice each year. Regularly remind all household members of the location.



Help firefighters help your pets: keep collars on pets and leashes at the ready in case firefighters need to rescue your pet. When leaving pets home alone, keep them in areas or rooms near entrances where firefighters can easily find them. Affix a pet alert window cling and write down the number of pets inside your house and attach the static cling to a front window. This critical information saves rescuers time when locating your pets. Make sure to keep the number of pets listed on it updated.



Install ABC fire extinguishers and know how to use them using the **PASS** method: **Pull** the pin, **A**im at the base of the fire, **S**queeze the lever, **S**weep side to side. One per floor is recommended as well as the kitchen and garage. Place the extinguisher away from the stove and near the doors. Consult your fire department on proper use and maintenance.

Use common sense. If you perceive the fire is too big to handle leave the house immediately. Do not stop to gather anything. Call 911 from outside. Once outside, stay outside.

# From the Green Superintendent, Chad Johnson

Greetings,

Taking divots during a round of golf is unavoidable, but getting them to heal can be a challenge for superintendents.



The way different grasses grow has a big impact on divot recovery. Some heal from roots and stems. Seed can also help divots recover for some grasses, but not all! In addition, temperature matters when it comes to divot recovery. Seeds will not germinate when it's too cold and grass won't fill in from stems when it's not growing well. The growth of almost any grass slows down in winter, but many cool-season grasses also slow down during the summer.

Divot recovery will often slow down right as play is peaking, which is not a great combination. Divots in shaded areas, wet areas or areas with poor irrigation coverage will struggle to heal no matter what type of grass is present. Traffic also plays a role. Lots of traffic will slow down divot recovery because new stems or seedlings are repeatedly trampled. This issue is especially noticeable on small tees or other areas where traffic is concentrated.

#### What Can Golfers Do to Help?

The first step is knowing how the course wants divots repaired. Some want you to replace divots as much as possible, others prefer you use mix rather than trying to replace the turf.

My take - both are adequate solutions. For me, the sand and seed method is the most efficient. But I have no qualms if someone hits a huge divot the size of a "beaver pelt" and replaces it.

Make sure you have divot mix with you and do your best to properly repair your divots. If the divot is intact and still has soil and roots attached, just replace it and push down with your foot to smooth it out. If the divot can't be replaced, use the divot mix. Add mix until its level with the surrounding grass and use your foot to smooth it out.

Try to avoid taking divots on practice swings and resist the temptation to use the course as a practice facility. You may want to drop a few extra balls to work on a tough shot, but it doesn't take many golfers doing this to greatly increase the number of divots. Please keep your practice sessions at the practice area.

Even when golfers and the Greens Team do all they can, there are going to be times of the year when lots of play and imperfect weather keep divots around longer than anyone would like.

# Practice Time and How You Get the Most Out of Your Time

You should always have a plan for each practice session.

You do not have to be overly detailed, in fact, you don't even need to work on anything in particular! Maybe you have been playing well, and you just want to keep it going, or maybe you just have a few minutes and want to get a few swings in. In these cases, it can easily end up with you just hitting some aimless shots where you do not know if you've actually hit a good shot or not.


If you are just going to hit a few balls, especially before playing, make sure you always pick a target so that you recreate a feeling like you'll have on the course.

The main point is that if you go into a practice session with a goal in mind, you will find it much easier to have a positive one!

# Shaping a Brighter Future for All Students

As the school year ends, our team is reflecting on our progress in serving our students and the community. Many of our efforts are centered around four major goals:

Literacy, Communication, Culture and Attendance.

#### Literacy: Empowering our Students

Literacy remains our top priority, as it is the foundation for learning. This year, we provided more opportunities for teacher collaboration and training. Every Wednesday afternoon, our teachers participated in activities to receive training from educational experts, review student growth data, adjust lesson plans and discuss methods to better meet individual needs. A committee of staff and administrators was formed to adopt a new K-5 reading and writing curriculum that emphasizes strong foundational skills for K-2 and comprehension for K-5, ensuring consistency and eliminating gaps in learning. Our Board was excited to approve the new materials. This significant investment will be a huge step forward for our students, as we implement this new curriculum in September.

#### **Building Stronger Communication**

We recognized the need to improve communication. This year, we've dramatically increased our social media presence, updated our website including contact information for board members and hosted coffee talks with the Principal. We've engaged families at school events like our carnival with record attendance of 450 people! We surveyed parents for their input on a variety of topics. Our newly formed Family-Teacher Organization (FTO) is supporting school functions and raising funds. Our Indian Parent Committee (IPC) is growing with new leadership and ideas. Our Principal's Sunday evening calls to families have boosted attendance and engagement. Our Superintendent, Dr. Gibbon, has partnered with the Skokomish tribe, neighboring districts, local organizations, state agencies and community groups to enhance our district's profile and build strong relationships. Communication will continue to improve as we launch an updated website, new school app and publish an informative new annual report.

#### Celebrating and Strengthening Our Culture

The pandemic brought unprecedented challenges that affected our district's culture, leading to learning insecurity and a lack of enthusiasm for school. Frequent changes in leadership exacerbated these issues. However, we are pleased to have stable leadership in place now and we are developing a district plan with broad input from all stakeholders. This plan will outline our educational values, goals or our students and the steps we will take to achieve them.

We remain committed to honoring and integrating the rich cultural heritage of the Skokomish Tribe into our school programs and activities, ensuring that our Native students see their identities reflected and celebrated in their education. All our students have benefitted from three Native History and Culture assemblies this year and an incredible Earth Day celebration at Potlatch State Park. This summer, our staff will be trained by the Office of Native Education on the "Since Time Immemorial" curriculum and the District and the Tribe are co-funding an effort to enhance that curriculum with the Skokomish and Tuwadug history, culture and traditions. This will allow us to teach the children of our community the interesting and living history of the place where they live.

### **Enhancing Attendance and Engagement**


Attendance became one of our key priorities. Our Principal, Mr. Torres, introduced creative attendance challenges that have led to a significant improvement in regular school attendance. Ensuring that students are present and on time is crucial for their learning. Our recent efforts, including community truancy teams, have made Hood Canal a leader in the state in improving attendance.

#### **A Call for Community Partnership**

The success of our students relies on authentic partnerships with families, the Tribe, government agencies and local businesses. We're proud of the progress this past year, but we know there is more work to be done. We need your ideas, feedback and perspectives. We invite you to attend school events, respond to upcoming surveys, visit or livestream Board meetings and reach out any time to share your ideas and concerns. We are here to listen and respond. Together, we can transform Hood Canal from a good school to a great school!

# **Screen Time** By Alderbrook Properties

- Carefully remove the screens, handling them only with the plastic pins or tabs to avoid damage.
- Mark each screen with the corresponding window if cleaning multiple screens at once.
- Use an eco-friendly cleanser mixed with water or mix 1/4 cup of white vinegar with ½ gallon of warm water.
- Spray the screens with a hose or rinse them in the shower using minimal water pressure.
- Lightly scrub with a soft-bristled brush. If the cleaning solution gets dirty, discard it and mix a new batch.
- Rinse the solution off with minimal water pressure.
- Dry the screens by shaking off excess water. If drying outside, flip the screen to dry both sides evenly.

Cleaning once or twice a year is usually sufficient to keep your screens in good condition.


