Emergency Preparedness Advisory Committee (EPAC) By Judy Hartford, Chair

Wildfire season is right around the corner. And while it may seem like we've had enough rain to keep our surrounding forests lush and green through this fall, Meteorologists are predicting that our wet winter will be followed by a drier than normal summer. Now is the time to consider the following:

- ✦ Would you be prepared if wildfire threatened Alderbrook?
- ✦ Have you considered the potential fire hazards that may exist on your property or around your neighborhood?
- ✦ Would you like to learn how to reduce wildfire risks around you?

The Emergency Preparedness Advisory Committee (EPAC) is hosting a Firewise Speaker's Event for all AGYC homeowners on April 22 at 6pm in the Clubhouse Boardroom. Our speakers will address the 2026 wildfire season and provide practical advice and free resources to help our community reduce the risk of wildfire impact on Alderbrook.

Our speakers will include Union #6 Fire Chief Clint Volk who will discuss the upcoming fire season and what our local firefighters are doing to prepare for it. The Department of Natural Resources Mason County Coordinator Jesse Duvall will provide practical advice on how to reduce fire risk around your home. Did you know that the Department of Natural Resources offers free property assessments for homeowners who want to know how best to reduce wildfire risk on their property? You'll be able to sign up for a free assessment during this event. Alec Pennington, President of Lake Cushman's Firewise Committee will describe how his community has been using a "Firewise" approach to reduce wildfire risk in their neighborhoods.



Please join us for this important and informative event. EPAC will also provide information on our second annual Firewise Neighborhood Clean-Up Weekend scheduled for May 15–16. During that weekend, we will have several dumpsters available at AGYC to accept downed tree limbs, brush and other organic debris that have accumulated in our yards over the winter. If you are unable to transport your collected yard waste to a dumpster, we'll have trucks that can pick it up and transport it for you. Our goal is to reduce dried brush from properties that could potentially fuel a wildfire event at Alderbrook.

The best time to prepare for a natural disaster is before it strikes. We are surrounded by beautiful, forested land. That's one of the things we value most about living here. We've also seen the impact of wildfire in the Hood Canal and Olympic Forests areas. It's been close enough to see and smell. Let's do what we can now to protect ourselves and our neighbors.

New Discussions

The committee discussed the county permitting process and cost and why we may want to change our construction guidelines to recommend that builders other than AP get design approval from the B&A prior to submitting Mason County permits. Applying for county permits prior to getting B&A approval could possibly cause the builder to have to re-apply to the county if B&A doesn't approve the design. New county permits would be an additional cost for the builder. This issue is for builders other than AP. AP's homes are pre-approved. It was mentioned that the septic design should be done first since this dictates the house size. A site plan should be done after the septic design.

Planning Projects

Changes to Construction Guidelines, re: AGYC construction permit expiration for new construction to 1-year from issuance of county permits and process for renewing expiring permits. Also, consider clarification in Guidelines for smaller home footprint approval process to include the Board of Directors.

The Men's Club began on March 25 with a club meeting, followed by 18 holes of medal play. We had a total of 33 in attendance. We welcomed three new members this season: Steve Payne, Tim Stutzman and Gary End.

One of the major decisions we voted on was whether to increase the cost to play from \$7 to \$10 each week. After explaining the reasons for the increase, (ease for the Golf Shop, increase payouts for winners, three KP winners each week instead of two and automatic entry into the Traveler's season-long event), each member voted by individual ballot. The final tally was 31 yes and 2 no. The motion passed.

Another major change this year is when mistakes are made on the signed, turned-in scorecards. If you turn in a card that has a larger number than you actually had on a hole or total score, that score will be posted. If you make a mistake and put a smaller number on the scorecard and turn it in, you will be disqualified for the day. Therefore, everyone was reminded to check their score before signing the scorecard and let the Golf Shop add the numbers for your total score.

Proposed Deer Droppings Rule

There has been a push to make a local rule about deer droppings on our course. We are blessed and burdened with these beautiful creatures. The new rule would allow a golfer to take free relief from the droppings: lift, clean and place the ball within one club length of the original spot, no nearer the hole, in the same area. The local rule would apply only to the general areas and not apply in penalty areas or bunkers. Unless this is addressed before the next meeting by the Golf Shop or Men's Club officials, this item will be discussed at the May 6 Men's Club meeting.

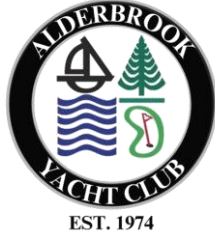

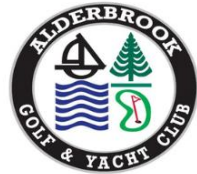

Alderbrook Fauna Focus (AFF): Turkey Vulture By Kelly Haupt

Jill and I were standing next to the Icicle River near the fish hatchery in Leavenworth a few years back. It was October and fall Chinook were spawning and dying in the river. A sight across the river caught my eye. I said to Jill, “Hey, look....turkeys!” And she said, “No, those are turkey *vultures!* Feeding on the salmon carcasses.” I felt quite silly and had to laugh at myself. *Of course they’re turkey vultures.* From a distance, their likeness to wild turkeys is quite striking indeed!

Migratory turkey vultures just arrived here last month from the southern United States and Mexico. Their scientific name, *Cathartes aura*, translates to *cleansing breeze*. Vultures are not predatory. Ancient Egyptians revered the vulture, which never kill for sustenance, but rather clean-up the already-dead, gathering upon a carcass where they “go to work returning life to soil” (L. Haupt).

Locating food is done by sight and a sharp sense of smell for carrion odors. This can bring in several vultures to convene around a carcass, but the feeding is mostly orderly, one at a time, by dominance. Lacking the strength or sharpness of beak or talons to tear open tough hide, they will wait for a raven or coyote to do it for them, after starting on softer areas themselves.

Turkey vultures are the best of all land birds at soaring. Their 6-to-7-foot wingspans and long finger-like primary feathers at their wingtips aid in gliding continuously for hours on end, with little to no flapping required. As they soar, their body forms a shallow V-shape (unlike Bald Eagles which are flat), and teeter with a side-to-side rocking motion. Observing these things allows you to quickly distinguish a vulture from an eagle or hawk.

Uniquely (and perhaps creepily), their digestive tract can handle rotten organic material with no ill effects.

Even more cringe-worthy may be the fact that turkey vultures will projectile-vomit towards a threat in self defense. When roosting on low branches or resting on the ground, they may hunch over and sway side to side. If these traits seem unsettling, that’s a normal reaction of course. But before relegating vultures to your list of dislikable creatures, take a moment to reflect upon their scientific name, *Cathartes aura*.....*cleansing breeze*. My sister and author Lyanda Lynn Haupt writes in her new book* *Among the Birds: Field Notes from Cascadia*: “If we can keep from flinching, the turkey vulture shows us that we are not alone, not separate. We are instead surrounded, and cradled, and ultimately called by all who have gone before. Scoop a handful of soil, and breathe deep, for there resides our ancestors. Grandmother, tree, deer, father, wolf.” For me, seeing turkey vultures soaring effortlessly above our treetops, or the rocky ridges along the Icicle River, invokes a sense of awe, calm, and reverence.

Past AGYC Member An Unsung Hero

This article recognizes past AGYC member, Paul Strapac. Paul was a major volunteer regarding AGYC’s water system.

“You have to do something!” The 78-year-old Vietnam veteran Paul Strapac grabbed a ladder to rescue his bleeding neighbor who was trapped upstairs as the house was on fire.

MONROE, Wash. — A 78-year-old Vietnam veteran is being praised for his quick action — after saving his neighbor from a burning home early Wednesday morning in Monroe. The fire broke out just before 6am at a two-story home along Chain Lake Road. Snohomish Regional Fire and Rescue says the homeowner’s wife and young child managed to escape, but the man stayed behind to look for the family cat, only to become trapped in an upstairs room as flames quickly spread. That’s when neighbor Paul Strapac heard cries for help.

“I heard him yelling, ‘help, help, help,’” Strapac recalled. “He was kind of out of the window, and at that point I ran back into the garage and got the ladder.” Strapac climbed up and helped pull the man out of the window, just moments before fire crews arrived. Both men were covered in blood after breaking the glass to escape.

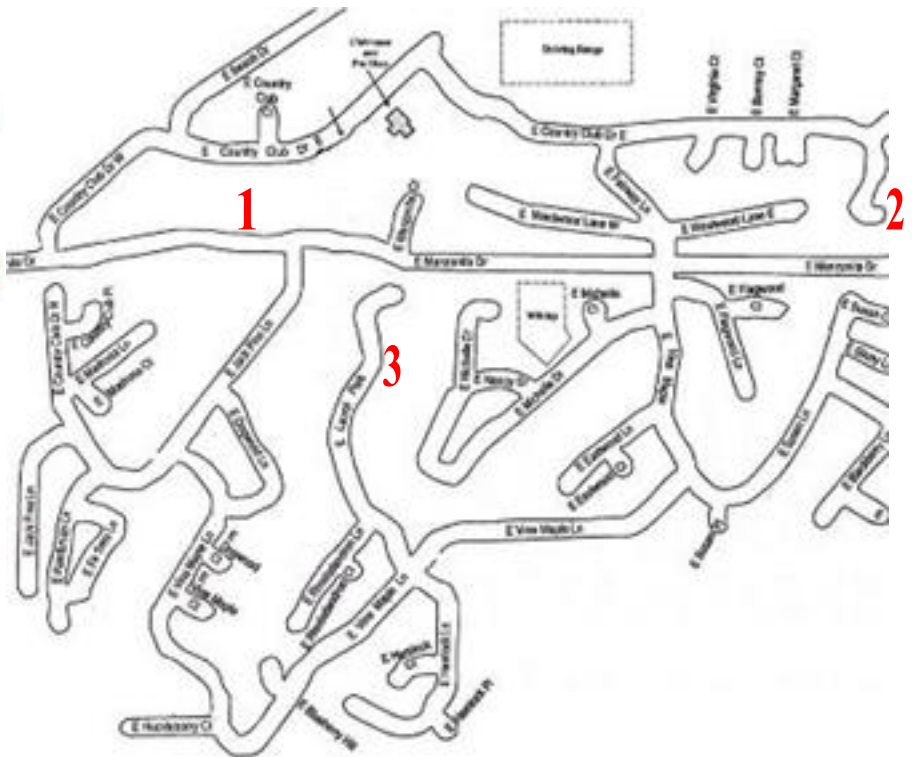
